A journey of almost 300 days: How a baby who fit in the palm of a hand leaves the NICU smiling and laughing

One thing they don't teach you as an expectant mother is how to deal with the pressure of being your unborn baby's caretaker – when you, yourself, have no experience being a mother.

The worrying for a mom starts when the pink line appears. For Alicia Zarate, playing the Creed song "Higher" would always get her baby moving in her belly, giving her a sense of relief that all was well. Whenever she felt like something was off, Creed coming through the speakers gave her some peace, but one day during her 25th week of pregnancy, her little trick for getting baby Nathan dancing didn't work.

An urgent trip to the hospital showed Alicia was experiencing preeclampsia and fetal growth restriction, putting baby Nathan's life on the line.

The following day, Nathan entered the world at 14.3 ounces – just about the size of a can of pop. His struggling body could fit into the palm of a hand, and so his 300-day journey to home began.

With his doctors declaring him the sickest baby in the NICU, support and numerous interventions would be required if Nathan was going to survive. From eye damage and pneumonia to heart surgery and a tracheostomy tube to help him breathe, this baby faced more hardship, adversity and struggle than most grown adults - yet,









through it all, this little warrior never lost his spirit, fighting each day to beat the odds.

With an A1 NICU team at Advocate Children's Hospital in Park Ridge. Illinois, by his side each step of the way, Nathan's journey took a triumphant turn. Nine months later, this past August, staff lined the halls in joyful anticipation as a smiling, active, 14-pound baby boy was

walked out the door by his parents and felt sun on his face for the first time – ready to go home and thrive in a beautiful new chapter filled with hope and possibility.

What lesson does a 9-month-old fighter like Nathan teach us?

Anything is possible in the hands of the right team – our team.

Our Pledges

When our organization came together in 2022, we focused our work around six pledges as a road map for success as a combined organization. Now, two years later, we're proud of the progress we've made on these commitments as we watched 'better together' come to life.

As we move FORWARD, together, with a unified Purpose and Commitments and our REWIRE 2030 strategy, we remain committed to this work and are thrilled to share the movement we've made in our pledges this year. Elevate Clinical Preeminence & Safety

- Reduced patient mortality by 14% since our combination

Advance Learning & Discovery

- Announced a new record for research funding: \$436M, up 37% year over year
- Implemented DAX Copilot with 1.8K clinicians, with 40% of users saving at least 30 minutes per day (first health system in the country to deploy this tool!)
- Put virtual nursing in place in 22 hospitals, utilizing three virtual nursing models of care; projected to serve more than 55K patients this year

Build a Next-Generation Workforce

- Hired 7.5K net teammates across the enterprise through August 2024

Advance Health Equity

The fight of his life, for his daughter: When stage 4 liver cancer threatens one of our own

When your life's work is saving people – literally organ donation by organ donation – you understand all too well how critical a role health care workers play. But it's so much more than words and actions, and for Travis Kerns, it became about his daughter.

Travis, an Atrium Health MedCenter Air teammate, has played a role in transporting 6K+ patients, providing live organs to recipients in the most need. On the worst day of someone's life, Travis gets to play a role in saving another. Little did he know, he'd soon be the one in need. At age 41, he learned he was suffering from stage 4 liver cancer and would need a liver transplant himself.

Travis immediately focused on what he had to live for – seeing his 11-year-old daughter Kennedi grow up, graduate from college and having the chance to walk her down the aisle. Heck, holding a grandbaby might be in his distant future too – if he could fight, and win, this battle.


He knew just the team to support him through the most trying time of his life – the experts at Atrium Health Levine Cancer and Atrium Health Transplant and Liver Center. Just like Travis was always there for his patients and teammates, they were there for Travis, his daughter and his ex-wife, who never left his side after his diagnosis.

You see, everyone who worked with Travis said the same thing. He was cheerful, spectacular and always smiling. Now, it was on them to return that energy and care back to him.

Medical Oncology, Transplant Hepatology and Transplant Surgery banded together helping carry Travis through three years of treatment. When one of our own was in need, oncologists and surgeons from Atrium Health Levine Cancer and Atrium Health Transplant and Liver Center stepped up, along with liver transplant coordinators, social workers, financial coordinators, pharmacists and dietitians. Everyone rallied around Travis to give him the proper care he needed.

Then in March, the phone rang, and it was the call he was waiting for. A match was found, and it was time for his transplant.

This life-saving surgery used a new liver pump technology to facilitate the process, with Atrium Health as one of the initial 20 U.S. transplant centers to adopt this groundbreaking technology. It provides

Clinical Preeminence and Safety

Our commitment to safety is the driving force in making us the most trusted choice for care.



Through improved clinical documentation, we **avoided 489 patient complications**, leading to improved performance on public reporting and allowing clinical teams to drive improvements without the "noise" of documentation-related inconsistencies.

Making Advocate Health a safe place of care and work We're acting on our commitment to safety by:

Safety reporting and awareness saves lives

A culture that supports event reporting provides the opportunity to work toward eliminating patient harm.

Uniting our safety huddles

We extended weekly patient safety huddles across the enterprise, creating alignment and providing a pivotal structure for rapid resolution, loop closure for system issues, support integration and situational awareness.

Communication and awareness with our frontline teams

Weekly focus bundles for leaders were launched as a framework to align our organization's safety efforts across regional, site and department huddles, consistently promoting a culture of safety across all departments.

Integration in action Emergency care video visits

THE GOAL: Scale across the Wake Forest Baptist and Charlotte markets.

THE HOW: This patient-facing offering connects patients to the Advocate Health brand, avoids unnecessary Emergency Department (ED) visits and helps navigate the optimal location for next steps in their care journey.

THE RESULT: Why don't you hear it from a clinician?



One of the most frustrating parts of a patient's ED visit is when they are evaluated and have the perception that their unplanned illness didn't need a long ED wait and hospital bill. When we review patients' charts, we see patients often start the visit by saying, 'I know I need to be seen, but don't know if I need to come to the ED tonight or not.' This is one of the key gaps we fill with our video visits for emergency care. More than 75% of the time we're able to reassure patients and prevent an unnecessary ED visit.

A good catch from one of our own teammates

Melanie, a physical therapist, went to evaluate a patient who had been in a car accident and suffered fractures to their face.

The patient had a history of stroke, and Melanie noticed the patient was showing signs of weakness. The physician had recently seen the patient and thought the patient was drowsy from medication given the night before. However, Melanie was concerned and uncomfortable with this assessment.

She recognized this as a safety concern and called for a code stroke on the patient. It was discovered the patient had a large intraventricular hemorrhage and was transferred to the ICU for treatment.

Melanie did a great job speaking up for a patient who was unable to do so for themselves.



Meeting patients where they are

Street psychiatry

We're providing mental health treatment to our unsheltered community in a place where the patient feels most comfortable. The model overcomes barriers to accessing care through traditional outpatient behavioral health services that require the patient to travel to a brick-and-mortar building for treatment.





When our community needed us most, we were there

Hurricane Helene's devastating effects left thousands in the Carolinas helpless, including many of our own. Our team stepped into action, deploying our MED-1 advanced mobile hospital, MedCenter Air, and expanding our Hospital at Home program to provide immediate relief to those in need.

In just a few days, our teams delivered



lbs of food, clothing, generators and more to counties, schools and hospitals





Families who normally would have braved miles of traffic just to find medical care now had access to digital X-rays, ultrasounds, labs, pharmacy services, 14 acute care beds and a two-bed operating room, among other essential medical capabilities.

Nurses at Atrium Health Cabarrus took their care beyond hospital walls, setting up a temporary home in a hospital room and fostering a patient's rescue dog, who saved his owner's life. Three years ago, Jamie and his sister pooled their allowance money to rescue Tucker, who was the very last pup in the animal shelter, waiting to be put down. After Jamie saved Tucker, it was Tucker's turn to save Jamie. When the effects of Hurricane Helen caused a mudslide that demolished Jamie's house, with him, his sister and grandparents still in it, it was his dog that led to his rescue. Tucker didn't give up until he figured out where Jamie was in 12 feet of rubble, marking exactly where firefighters could find him. Jamie and his family lost their home and everything they owned, but our nurses rose to the occasion, going beyond providing medical care and pooling their own money to provide all the necessities for Jamie's family - including outfitting a hospital room as their temporary home – and, of course, taking in Tucker as their own.



A place where a kid can be a kid, if even for a weekend

At first, they were all linked together by loss. By the end, they were connected by friendship and healing.

At a sunshine-filled, lakeside campground in Wisconsin, 20 children joined together, along with volunteers and our teammates, for Camp Bear Hugs's third annual event. This wasn't your typical summer camp, though. These kids all had a tragic, common thread: They recently experienced the death of a loved one.

The two-day-long grief support camp offered kids, with a volunteer "buddy" to guide them, the opportunity to heal, grieve and feel their full spectrum of emotions, alongside others who were experiencing similar losses. Some were even returning for a second year. This much-needed outlet provided the safe space these children needed to express loneliness, anger and fear among company who was equipped to help them process and cope.

Grief is a complicated emotion with no timeline, and for these young campers – some who had lost siblings or grandparents – they were robbed of their innocence, of being a kid. Camp Bear Hugs gives them just a little of that back, surrounding them with support and still giving them the chance to just be kids, with simple pleasures like music, games, arts and crafts, and even ice cream, as part of the weekend.

The only way out is through, and activities geared toward healing brought up emotional memories of their loved ones for the kids. "Noah's blue" was a paint color created by 7-year-old camper Elliot, who was mourning the loss of his older brother Noah. He created the special color by mixing several shades of blue to show how he felt during his brother's dying journey, after losing him and how he wants to feel in the future.

Later, camper Brandon, who had lost both his brother and grandmother, was taking photos on a photo hunt. Although they seemed completely random to his volunteer buddy David, Brandon later explained that he took a photo of an old wagon on the campground because his little brother, who passed away accidentally at the age of 2 the year before, liked to be pulled



around in one. Another photo of a swing set brought up memories of happy family times together.

In its namesake event, the kids create bears made from the clothing of their loved one, decorate them and leave special messages inside. As a tribute to his grandmother who had passed, Brandon used costume jewelry to decorate his bear, items that she loved. There's something to be said for giving these kids a tangible remembrance to hold on to when down the line, when the weekend camp is behind them, and the inevitable waves of sadness roll in.

Through Camp Bear Hugs, our hospice teammates and volunteers give these children hope, tools for the future and the space to share, reflect and perhaps, most importantly, be surrounded by kids who understand the heaviness they carry. It's in these cabins and fields of Wisconsin that the children get to take off their masks, not be the only one affected by a horrible loss and come away with a sense of healing.

We're committed to being part of the national solution to address the medical debt dilemma, including canceling all judgment liens previously placed on homes and real estate in attempt to collect unpaid medical bills. We've also begun forgiving the outstanding debts associated with those liens across the enterprise, beginning with the oldest cases. In total, we intend to cancel more than 11.5K liens, some dating back 20 years or more. (Note: None in Illinois.)

Aiming to expand job opportunities

Wake Forest Institute for Regenerative Medicine received the inaugural U.S. National Science Foundation Engines Program award, worth up to \$160M over 10 years. This project will provide an innovative ecosystem to stimulate workforce development, job creation and economic growth through the development of technologies that benefit the regenerative medicine industry.

Advancing maternal health research

An OB-GYN at Aurora Sinai Medical Center leads a study into whether simple antacids like TUMS can hasten labor and delivery in hopes of reducing the need for cesarean sections.

Joining the Moonshot

Researchers at Aurora St. Luke's Medical Center are collecting blood and tissue samples at different stages of cancer treatment for a new pilot called the Cancer MoonshotSM Biobank study, part of the National Cancer Institute's Cancer MoonshotSM initiative.

Care that never quits

Our community cancer clinics across Illinois and Wisconsin are enrolling participants in a National Cancer Institute-funded clinical trial to determine why young cancer survivors are at high risk for other health problems even well after their cancer treatment.

Ten years of research excellence

Advocate Health's own quarterly, peer-reviewed academic journal celebrates 10 years of publication. The Journal of Patient-Centered Research and Reviews has more than 400K article downloads.



Connecting with our community

- Wake Forest University School of Medicine created a pathway program with Winston-Salem State University to encourage more students to pursue careers as physician assistants.
- The Department of Biomedical Engineering within Wake Forest University School of Medicine joined with our sports medicine, orthopedic surgery and implementation science faculty to offer a football safety event with local youth and high school coaches.

Highlights of a successful year

Changing the quality game at hospital sites

- Aurora West Allis Medical Center launched auditory brainstem response testing.
- Advocate Sherman Hospital's Cardiometabolic Clinic was the first to launch in Illinois, serving 55 patients.

- Nurse candidate-centric hiring. 2.3K new graduate nurses, 800 nurse externs and 350+ summer nurse externs were hired across the enterprise through September.


Finding herself in her patients' shoes, oncology teammate sees her colleagues in a whole new light

Miriam Little always thought she knew what a cancer diagnosis meant. As a social worker in medical oncology at Harbin Clinic, she had spent years helping patients and their families navigate the difficult journey of cancer treatment. But everything changed the moment she heard those heart-stopping words herself: "You have cancer."

Miriam had been struggling with prolonged gastrointestinal symptoms that she couldn't shake. Not one to "ignore it and it might go away," she talked with her primary care physician, OB-GYN and a medical oncologist, who worked together to schedule the tests Miriam needed, discovering the heartbreaking diagnosis of ovarian cancer. The road ahead was a long one: surgery and then after, chemotherapy.

The first day she arrived at the cancer center for chemo, she didn't park in her usual spot in the staff lot. She parked in front, where all patients park, because she was a patient now, and she was going to fight this. She didn't go to her office and sit at her desk like she'd done every day for the last 10 years; she went to her chemo chair. She watched the educational movie and went through every step of the introductory process.

Miriam always knew how closely the clinic's teammates worked together



to identify the right, comprehensive care plan for each patient. Now, seeing her colleagues as her own care team and experiencing their care from the patient side, she was even more confident and calm. She never felt lost or didn't know what to expect next. She knew in her heart she was on the right path with the right team.


In February, Miriam rang the cancerfree bell at the cancer center, surrounded by all her friends, family and work family to celebrate.





With strong collaboration and innovative partnership, our teams are moving successfully through the three major phases of integration work: discovery, planning and execution.



Strength in scale: Uniting to manage a national crisis

When our largest IV fluid provider was impacted by Hurricane Helene, a serious reality settled in: Our IV fluid supply would run out in less than one week. That's where our team's resilience and commitment rose to the occasion. We received an overwhelming 125 submission ideas from teammates on how to conserve our supply, and we successfully hit utilization targets. One of these suggestions led to our team procuring 20K+ packets of oral hydration products from a big box retailer. Leveraging our extensive network and integrated systems, we immediately mobilized the sharing of our IV fluid stock to support sites who had a smaller supply, including a truckload of fluid sent from the Southeast Region to support Midwest hospitals. Our united efforts ensured safe, high-quality care, and demonstrated our impressive scale and the triumph of our integration, enabling our support to patients and clinicians across the country.



Our new partners: Harbin Clinic

Atrium Health Floyd and Harbin Clinic, the region's two longest-serving health care providers, finalized a long-anticipated strategic combination. With Harbin Clinic's 150-year legacy and Atrium Health Floyd's 80-year history, together, we have likely touched every family in Rome and Floyd County and many more in the surrounding communities where we serve.





From playing with friends to ICU: A young boy's brave battle with a snake bite

Brittain's day started like many peaceful Sundays in Georgia: at church, then lunch and hanging out with friends. But by the afternoon, the 8-year-old was in a hospital bed fighting for his life. The culprit? A snake bite.

It was a mom's worst nightmare, seeing her energetic boy who had just been playing like the child he was, lying there struggling to breathe with his blood pressure dangerously low. His care team at Atrium Health Levine Children's Beverly Knight Olson Children's Hospital, led by Dr. Jacob Kirkpatrick and Dr. Joshua Glenn, quickly worked to reduce the swelling in his upper airway, bring his blood pressure up and start the antivenom.

For three days, Brittain was unresponsive and on a ventilator to help him breathe, but our team was there – every step of the way – to ensure he was responding to the treatment.

Finally, those excruciating days passed, and he started to wake up. "He looked at me, and he was still on the ventilator, but he mouthed around the tube, 'I... love... you.' He used his little hands and pulled us in for a hug," Brittain's mom Katie said. "In that moment, I just felt like he's going to be OK."

But the nightmare wasn't over yet. As the swelling and redness worsened, the urgency became palpable – another round of



antivenom was needed. Despite the pain and uncertainty, Brittain's resilient spirit shone through. He responded to the treatment quickly, waking up with fierce determination that rose above his circumstances. He didn't want to wear the hospital gown any longer; like any kid, he craved something that reflected his vibrant personality. That's when one of our child life specialists stepped in, offering Brittain some shorts and

a Braves shirt, giving the baseball fan a real boost to get well and back on the field with his friends.

Even better – Brittain was able to go back home to celebrate his ninth birthday. It was a celebration of love and gratitude that brought smiles to all, from family and friends to the entire care team. That's what our team does for our communities.

When Chelsea Johnson's amniotic sac ruptured during her 27th week of pregnancy, she was admitted to our mother-baby unit for the remainder of her term. Our team made sure she didn't miss milestones for her other child, planning a birthday party and visit from Santa for her 1-yearold daughter.

Sadly, nine days after birth, Chelsea's newborn passed away, leaving Chelsea heartbroken. Again, the team stepped up, caring for her physically and emotionally. "They came in and picked up the pieces. They made my stay livable. They were my second family and home," she says. - Perform a Barostim implant in a heart failure patient: Natural sensors in the body can now tell the nervous system how to regulate heart function and relieve symptoms of heart failure by improving the heart's pumping efficiency
- Offer FARAPULSE Pulsed Field Ablation for the treatment of atrial fibrillation: The treatment minimizes risk and targets areas of the heart associated with abnormal heart rhythms

Advocacy in action

We continue to advocate on behalf of our patients and clinicians to ensure coverage and ability to deliver care virtually – including time on Capitol Hill and calls with legislators and Centers for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS) to discuss the importance of extending and making permanent telehealth and hospital at home waivers. We've also successfully lobbied CMS to extend waivers that avoid clinicians being required to report their home address.

Our service lines are reimagining care

- Aurora St. Luke's Medical Center and Advocate Lutheran General Hospital completed their first tricuspid valve replacement procedures using a TriClip. This minimally invasive technique lowers risk and shortens recovery time compared to traditional open-heart surgery, previously the only treatment option for this condition.
- Integrated stroke program successfully completed DNV stroke surveys for all Midwest Region hospitals, showing the efficiency of our integrated network and allowing us to standardize reviews with decreased variability by reviewers.
- Aurora West Allis Medical Center recognized as a Urologic Prosthesis Center of Excellence – the only one in Wisconsin, Illinois and Minnesota.
- New Southeast Region emergency department to acute patient transportation program reduced costs by 55% and improved response time by 48%.
- 1.7K+ students participated in Southeast Region behavioral health school-based therapy program, supporting 1.6K visits.
- Center for Digestive Health & Surgery launched essential elements for Centers of Excellence in the Southeast Region, including endoscopy expansion, provider recruitment and space planning.

Connect to **Purpose**

His world crashed. Then this surgeon received a lifeline.



After dedicating over a decade of his life to mastering the intricate skills of surgery, Dr. William Dugal faced a nightmarish reality at just 32 years old: he was unable to lift even a pinky finger.

This shocking turn of events unfolded just as he and his family were settling into their new life in North Carolina, filled with hopes and dreams for the future. However, everything came crashing down after Dr. Dugal contracted COVID-19 and began experiencing debilitating numbness and pain in his feet and legs. In no time at all, he couldn't walk or move his hands – the very lifeline to his life's work.

Faced with the terrifying prospect of losing his purpose, Dr. Dugal was rushed to Atrium Health Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center, where our ED team quickly discovered Dr. Dugal had the rare, and potentially



life-threatening, disorder Guillain-Barre Syndrome. Admitted to the hospital, the team acted swiftly placing him on a ventilator to assist his breathing. He was in a race against time.

That's when Dr. Lucas Neff got the call. Come help bring a fellow health care hero back to life - if not back to his life's work. Dr. Neff treated Dr. Dugal with ECMO (extracorporeal membrane oxygenation) – an innovative treatment that not every hospital has - and saved him.

But that's not the end of the story. Not by any stretch of the imagination. While it was the start of Dr. Dugal's long road to a miraculous recovery, it was also the beginning of his remarkable journey back to doing what he loved – practicing medicine. Through it all, Dr. Neff became not only his mentor, but his friend, encouraging him throughout his rehab. The road was arduous, and the months were long as he battled complications, but Dr. Dugal, with the help of his family and so many of our teammates who became like family, was able to walk again.

Just over a year after Dr. Dugal's illness and three months being out of his wheelchair, Dr. Neff invited him to work in our translational research lab at Wake Forest University School of Medicine. He jumped at the opportunity. In the midst of months of uncertainty, it was a lifeline, a plan to move forward.

Wake Forest University School of Medicine's training platforms and research infrastructure, plus the support of all the staff, helped Dr. Dugal regain his confidence and the surgical skills he had trained so hard for. An added twist? Dr. Dugal embarked on an ECMO fellowship, doing advanced training on the very technology that saved his life.

It's an experience that's given Dr. Dugal a new outlook – and gives us all inspiration and strength to continue to do the absolute best for our patients.
